Redcliffe Coast Guard Announces Program to Fight Sudden Cardiac Arrest

Redcliffe Coast Guard has announced that they have taken steps to increase chances of surviving a sudden cardiac arrest by placing an AED (automated external defibrillator) on board their primary rescue vessel.

Every year, sudden cardiac arrest claims the lives of at least 250,000 people. The

only known treatment for sudden cardiac arrest is the use of a defibrillator which delivers a powerful electric shock to stop the abnormal heart rhythm and allow the heart to return to a more normal beating pattern. Survival rates for a sudden cardiac arrest are less than 2% when defibrillation is delayed ten minutes or more.

"Our goal is to protect the lives of our crews and the boating public," said Bart Mcleod.

"Having the AED on board increases access to early defibrillation and helps us save lives, be that on land or out in

Moreton Bay."

Unlike defibrillators used by health care professionals, AED's do not require extensive medical knowledge to understand or operate. The expertise needed to analyse the hearts electrical function is programmed into the device, and enables ordinary people to provide treatment to victims of sudden cardiac arrest. A four hour training session covering both AED's and cardiopulmonary resuscitation is all that is necessary to learn how to use the device.

Research Headquarters nestled in Kippa Ring

You might not know about it, but right here in Kippa Ring, nestled between an X-Ray clinic and several offices at the Peninsula Specialist Centre sits the headquarters of one of the the fastest growing and most respected centres for Clinical Research in Australia.

At the Australian Clinical Research Organisation, Dr. Jeff Karrasch (pictured) oversees his group of Clinical Trial Coordinators, Doctors and Nurses and performs dozens of different research trials, ranging in duration from a few weeks to a few years and encompassing such conditions as diverse as paediatric rhinitis to an alternative to Warfarin therapy for cardiac patients. One current study involves a simple patient satisfaction survey after they are provided with an inhaler for their Asthma for a period of time. Another looks at added treatment for the memory problems of Alzheimer's, with a view to easing the burden on both the patient and the carer.

Inclusion in these trials is strictly voluntary and eligibility criteria and ethical guidelines are rigid. Before any new therapy or drug is released it goes through a series of Clinical Trials where data is collected on patients that are monitored quite closely during their trial period. These Trials are categorized into phases and range from phase one to phase four. The trials conducted at the centre are usually at least at a phase three trial level, which means the procedure or drug is nearing its final phase of development.

There is no charge for treatment at the centre and sometimes there is reimbursement available from the sponsor, depending on the amount of inconvenience and travel that might be



involved.

Care is first rate and you can do something for yourself and add to medical research by participating in a study that is appropriate for you. Climate change impacts are being felt around the world. The earth is reacting 50% more strongly to emissions than was predicted and Queensland's average temperature is projected to rise by up to 2 degrees Celsius by 2030, and its rainfall to drop by 13%. Some parts of our state will continue to get hotter and drier while others could face increased rainfall and bigger storms. Australia represents about 1.4% of total world emission. Any adjustment to climate change will require significant emission reductions by large industrial nations such as China, India and the USA. Climate change is one of the greatest challenges facing Queensland and the world. The Queensland government hosted the 2006 Climate Change Summit

at Parliament House and will be a key participant in the Australia New Zealand Climate Change Conference in Brisbane later this year.

In March this year the Premier opened the Queensland Climate Change Centre of Excellence (the first of its kind in Australia) which brings together more than 50 scientists who are experts in climate change science and policy. It has a whole of government focus and is tapping into the latest knowledge from around the world. Among its early projects are to identify and work with communities that may be affected by climate change, and working with local governments and rural industries in their future planning. Policy development in this area covers community, industry, transport, agriculture, adaptation and sets greenhouse targets.

So far Queensland has banned broad scale native vegetation clearing in 2006 and halted broad scale vegetation clearing which has led to a cut in greenhouse gas emissions by an estimated 20 million tonnes a year. A memorandum of understanding has been agreed with the Queensland Farmers' Federation on farm management systems to reduce greenhouse impact, and new homes have been required to comply with a minimum sustainable design measure to ensure they use water and energy more efficiently. There are more actions that can be taken to reduce greenhouse gas emissions, not just by governments, but by all of us – community groups, businesses, individuals and families.

On Monday 12 June 2007 Redcliffe City Council adopted the 2007–2008 Budget which will ensure external debt is contained at \$16 million and reserves at slightly above \$16 million. This is the fourth and final Budget for this term of Council and it brought back memories of my first Budget meeting in 2004 just after my election to Council. It was an extremely difficult process and I have to say while it is still a difficult process we made it easier by setting our course in 2004 to deliver strong financial management and we have continued to taken a disciplined and committed approach to improving the city's financial position.

footpath improvements that will reduce trip hazards and provide pedestrian access to key locations in the city. \$220,000 will be spent on further enhancement of the city's successful and popular bikeways and complete linkages in accordance with the Bikeway master plan and SEQ Regional Cycle Network.

Road Improvements
